About the Forum and Why It Matters



Imagine more than **1,500 people from across the world** - researchers, practitioners, survivors, policymakers, funders, and activists - all committed to ending violence against women and children, at a moment when the political, social, and funding conditions for this work are becoming increasingly difficult. **This is the SVRI Forum.**

SVRI Forum 2026 is the 9th Forum and remains the **world's largest abstract-driven convening dedicated to ending violence against women, violence against children, and other forms of violence driven by gender inequality.** It is the place where the field's most important

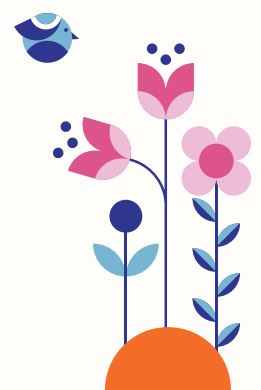
conversations happen - where evidence is debated, tensions are surfaced, and collective direction is shaped. A hallmark of the Forum is its ability to **weave together science, advocacy, and art** - creating a safe, inclusive space for difficult but essential conversations.

The programme is co-created with the field through thousands of abstract submissions - **2,186 for Forum 2026** - ensuring the agenda reflects what people are actually doing on the ground, the evidence they are building, and the questions that matter most to those most affected by violence.

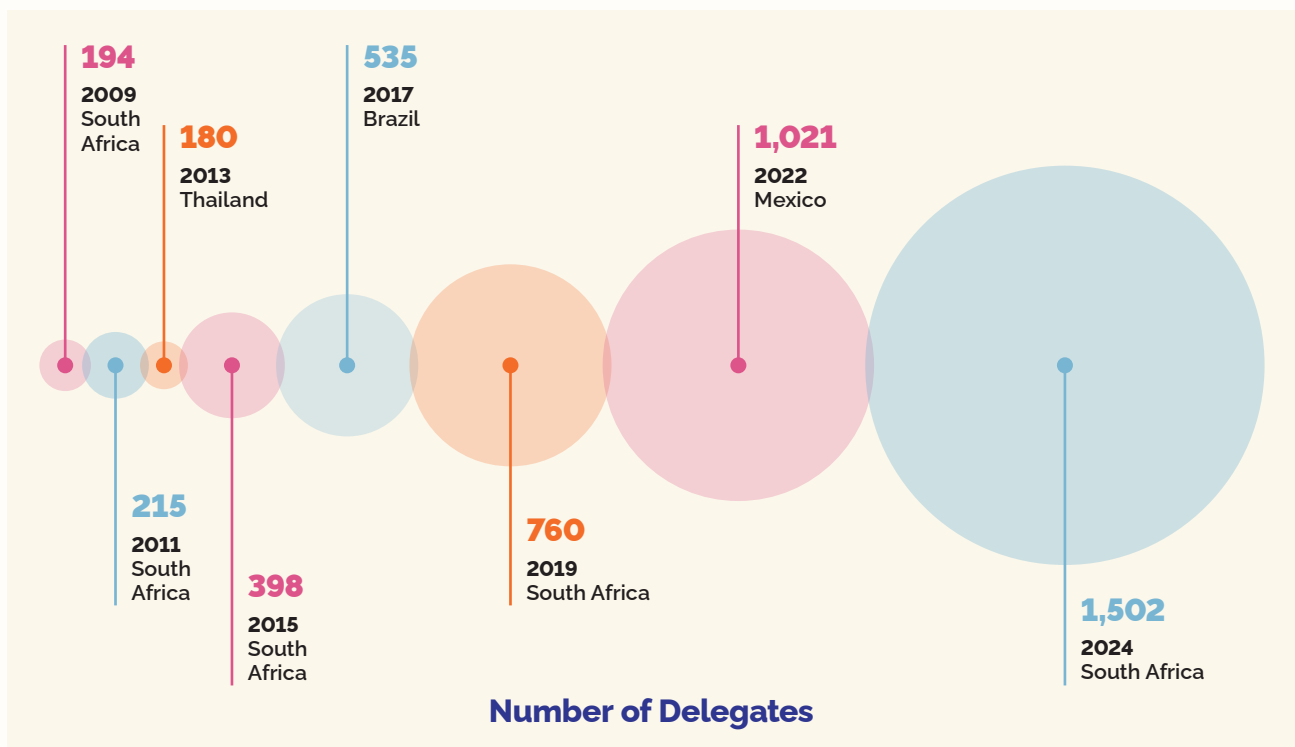

The Field Is Growing - and the Forum Has Grown With It

When the first SVRI Forum was held in 2009, 194 people attended. By 2024, that number had grown to 1,502 - a more than **670% increase**. This is not simply a bigger conference. It reflects a field that is expanding, maturing, and producing more evidence than ever before.

Presentations have grown from 96 in 2009 to 495 in 2024 - a **fivefold increase** that represents not just more voices, but more research being done, more questions being asked, and more answers being generated in service of ending violence.

Truly Global - and Deliberately So

The Forum draws participants from **142 countries**. But reach alone is not what makes it distinctive. What makes the Forum genuinely different is who is in the room.

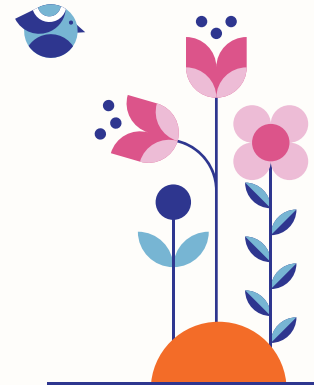
At Forum 2024, 67% of delegates came from low- and middle-income countries, and 79% of the countries represented were LMICs. These are the researchers, practitioners, and advocates who are closest to the work and most affected

by the conditions that enable violence - people who rarely have access to major international conferences, where registration fees, travel costs, and visa barriers routinely exclude those whose voices matter most.

Through bursaries, low registration fees, **equitable language interpretation**, and deliberate programme design, the Forum has made inclusion a structural commitment rather than an aspiration.

A Conference That Takes Care Seriously

People who work in the field of violence against women and children carry a significant burden. Researchers, practitioners, and survivors attend the Forum not only to share evidence but to do so from a place of lived experience and personal cost. The Forum takes that seriously.

Wellness is an integral part of the Forum, reflecting the SVRI's commitment to creating a supportive, inclusive, and nurturing environment for all participants. Recognising the challenging and emotionally demanding nature of this work, dedicated wellness activities and spaces are woven into the programme - not as incidental additions, but as a signal that this field cannot sustain itself without attending to the people who do the work.

At Forum 2024 in Cape Town, the **Wellbeing & Care Programme** offered trauma-informed yoga, trauma release exercises, breathwork, meditation, guided visualisations, and individual counselling with qualified clinical psychologists. A dedicated Brave Room provided quiet space for reflection and healing. Sacred circle discussions on collective care brought people together around shared questions: what does it mean to look after ourselves and each other in this field?

In 2024, **87% of delegates** who completed the evaluation felt that if they needed support, there were staff available to assist them. The response from participants spoke for itself.
